RESEARCH POSTER PRESENTATION GUIDELINES

An effective poster presentation for a college research project should be clear, concise, and visually appealing. The following is a suggested outline that prioritizes readability and impact.

Title

- **Main Title:** Title should be a clear, concise statement summarizing the research. Use a large, bold font.
- Authors & Affiliations: The name of the presenter and school.

Introduction

- **Hook:** Start with a bold, attention-grabbing statement or question.
- **Background:** Provide the necessary context. What's the problem or the current state of knowledge?
- Research Question or Hypothesis: State the specific question your research aims to answer, or the hypothesis you're testing.

Methods & Materials

- **Experiment Design:** Briefly describe your approach. Use bullet points or a numbered list for clarity.
- Data Collection: Explain how you collected your data.
- Key Materials & Equipment: List any critical materials, organisms, or specialized equipment used.

Results

- Main Findings: Use bullet points to highlight the key takeaways from your data.
 Use simple, direct language.
- Data Analysis: Explain how you evaluated and analyzed your data.

Conclusion

- **Interpretation:** Explain what your results mean in the context of your research question.
- Significance: Why do your findings matter? How do they advance the field of study?
- Future Directions: Suggest what the next steps for this research could be.

References & Acknowledgements

- References: List key papers that are essential to understanding your research.
 Use a standard citation format. (Consult your faculty mentor for guidance on which format to use.)
- Acknowledgements: Thank anyone who helped with the project, including your faculty mentor, teachers, advisors, lab members, funding agencies, etc.

Research involving human beings or identifiable information associated with human beings from any source must be reviewed by MCC's <u>Institutional Review Board - MCC</u> Kansas City. Please check with your faculty mentor for additional guidance.

Literature reviews can be utilized instead of (or in addition to) original research. Consult with your faculty mentor for further guidance.
