#### **PARALLELISM**

Parallelism involves using similar forms of words or phrases to show similar ideas. This frequently means using the same form for words or phrases in a list, as in:

I enjoy swimming, skiing, and hunting.

This sentence, which employs parallel construction in the <u>—ing</u> forms is much clearer and smoother than the following sentence, which is not parallel:

I enjoy swimming, skiing, and to hunt.

#### Consider each pair below:

- 1. I came. I would see and be conquering.
- 2. I came. I saw. I conquered.
- 3. Jean is both an artist and she spends time at athletics.
- 4. Jean is both an artist and an athlete.

Do 2, 4, and 6 sound more smoothly and clearly written to you? The underlined parts of 2, 4, and 6 are parallel. Two or more single words (slowed, slid, scored) can be parallel as can entire sentences (I came. I saw. I conquered.) But remember, parallel words must have the same grammatical form - a noun must be balanced with a noun, a past tense verb with a past tense verb.

In the following examples, note how much easier it is to read the column with parallel construction.

## **Lacking Parallel Construction**

I enjoy sewing and to plan wardrobes It's important to make good grades as well as having fun.

She expected a man to have a good job, to be good-looking, and who would pamper her every whim.

His experience made him sullen, bitter, and a cynic.

She asked him whether he could take shorthand and his experience.

## **Having Parallel Construction**

I enjoy sewing and planning wardrobes. It's important to make good grades as well as to have fun.

She expected a man to have a good job, to be good-looking, and to pamper her every whim.

His experience made him sullen, bitter, and cynical.

She asked him whether he could take shorthand and what experience he had had.

By hard work and because I invested my savings in the company, I won a promotion. She wanted a house with seven rooms, a two-car garage, and it should be in a good location.

By hard work and by investing savings in the company, I won a promotion. She wanted a house with seven rooms, a two-car garage, and a good location.

Here are examples of thesis statements, which, of course, should always use parallel construction.

My summer job a t a resort was worthwhile because it gave me money for college, I hadn't had a full-time job before, and I had time for recreation.

A college student should not live at home because he needs to be independent, friendships in a dorm, and he wastes time commuting. My summer job at a resort was worthwhile because it gave me money for college, experience in a full-time job, and time for recreation. A college student should not live at home because he needs to be independent, he will make more friends in a dorm, and he won't waste time commuting.

# Consider the following:

She judged the painting <u>for</u> accuracy, <u>for</u> style, and <u>for</u> quality. They all felt <u>that he had</u> cheated, <u>that he had</u> lied, and <u>that he had</u> been let off lightly.

It would also be correct to write these sentences the following way, but they would lose emphasis.

She judged the paintings for accuracy, style, and quality. They all felt that he had cheated, lied, and been let off lightly.

Some groups of words demand a parallel construction:

not only...but also either...or neither...nor then...now

yesterday. . .today both. . .and whether. . .or on one hand. . .on the other hand
